
## RCAF Liberator bomber (B-24)

- Liberator 589 "D" from No. 10 (BR) Squadron in Gander
- Normally flew anti-submarine patrols over North Atlantic
- Took off on a night practice flight on Sept. 4, 1943
- Eyewitnesses saw the plane climb from the runway and then barrel-roll several times, stall and crash into Gander Lake

#### RCAF Liberator bomber 589

Three RCAF crew and one passenger killed:

- Wing Commander John Young, Flight
   Officer Victor Bill & LAC Gordon Ward
- Squadron Leader (Dr.) Grant MacKenzie doing medical research on hearing loss in aircrew

Navy divers spent 10 days trying to recover bodies and the aircraft



Adam Templeton of the Marine Institute collected video of the bomber wreck using an ROV



## Project Outcomes


- Provincial and national TV and radio news coverage of initial discovery and diving surveys
